

They stand resplendent in exquisite settings, offering opulence with soul, fantasy with fun, and generously sprinkling their stardust on guests. Welcome to the most spectacular hotels on Earth



Castles in the air



HOTEL CASTELLO DI RESCHIO Perugia, Italy

With the most enchanting taste, Count Benedikt Bolza and his wife Nencia have lovingly restored and decorated their 10th-century castle – once a romantic ruin – into a place of dreams and one of the most stunning hotels in the world. Reschio is a poem of loveliness: the castle bedecked with the finest Italian linens, antiques and vases of wild flowers. Nor is there anything derivative or gimmicky about its transformation. Yes, the pool might be infinity; but it's so cleverly sculpted into the meadow that it looks like a lake formed at the dawn of time. The equestrian facilities are extraordinary, as is the beauty of the estate's Spanish horses. (Watch Count Benedikt's father Antonello do his daily dressage: it's pure Visconti.) Moreover, most of the food is organically grown or reared on the 1,500-hectare estate. This is a true utopia: in a time when hotels can't wait to boast of their eco credentials, the Bolzas hate to discuss their 'sustainability' plans, because they do it naturally, and have

done so for years. Florian, the charming general manager, understands

the magic of a hotel being run like a friend's grand yet comfortable

country house (but with slicker service and white-jacketed waiters to shake up fabulous Negronis). Reschio also offers the world's most romantic spa, the dreamy Bathhouse, which is home to a hammam, sauna and a large plunge pool that fills the castle's dramatic vaulted stone cellar. The exceptional therapist Maria performs the most extraordinary lymphatic drainage massage and treatment involving a wallow in a bathtub filled with camomile flowers and other herbs collected by the countess. Time spent here is magical; there could be no more enchanting a spot for sitting on a terrace overlooking the Umbrian hills, feasting on tagliolini with white truffles (you can forage for them in autumn). Summers are recreated the way they used to be here: jazz evenings; swing dancing in the restaurant-hangout Alle Scuderie; joining the owners' family in the shelling of lavender at harvest time; enjoying lavish picnics in the lake cabin and spending the day on the water; or cantering in the golden light of dusk through this ancient landscape.
